Call to Worship

In today's Gospel reading we meet a blind man by the name of Bartimaeus. When he met Jesus he said "Lord, that I may see." This is a prayer we can make our own, because in some ways we too are blind and it seems that at times we prefer blindness to seeing. We need to ask God to forgive our wilful blindness and to help us see better.

StF 8 – God with us Creator, Father

Reading: Mark 10:46-52

Then they came to Jericho. As Jesus and his disciples, together with a large crowd, were leaving the city, a blind man, Bartimaeus (which means "son of Timaeus"), was sitting by the roadside begging. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" Many rebuked him and told him to be quiet, but he shouted all the more, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" Jesus stopped and said, "Call him." So they called to the blind man, "Cheer up! On your feet! He's calling you." Throwing his cloak aside, he jumped to his feet and came to Jesus. "What do you want me to do for you?" Jesus asked him. The blind man said, "Rabbi, I want to see." "Go," said Jesus, "your faith has healed you." Immediately he received his sight and followed Jesus along the road.

First Reflection - Mark 10:46-52

In Biblical times blindness was very common due to poor hygiene and lack of medical care. Today we have eliminated many of the diseases that cause blindness and we have invented all kinds of devices to improve our seeing. We have ordinary glasses, bifocals, magnifying glasses, binoculars, telescopes and microscopes. We can see more and farther than at any time in our history.

Physical sight is a wonderful gift that we should never take for granted. A woman tells of how her life was turned upside down when she lost her sight as the result of a car crash. Ever since she has inhabited a world of darkness. Now, several years later she barely remembers what her children look like. She hasn't seen any of her grandchildren. She says that she would have been happy if she had only been left with the vision of one eye and not received any compensation. She says that she would love to be able to tell night from day.

Physical sight is a great gift but Jesus didn't come to earth to give us physical sight. The miracle he performed for Bartimaeus happens regularly in our hospitals today. We hear of people who have been blind for many years miraculously having their sight restored, or at least partially restored. So, does this mean that the gospel story has no relevance for us? No, because the Gospel story is not about physical seeing. Jesus didn't come to earth to give us physical sight but the kind of sight that enables us to see heavenly realities. The gospel story is about how a man came to believe in Jesus.

His journey from blindness symbolises the journey from unbelief to faith which is a journey from darkness to light. St Paul tells his converts at Ephesus "For you once were in darkness but now you are light in the Lord". There is blindness that is worse than physical blindness - the blindness of unbelief. Physical sight is a marvellous gift but faith is more precious still. Without faith there is a sense that we will always be in the dark - faith opens our eyes to a new vision of the world.

The gospel story is more a discipleship story than a healing story. When Bartimaeus was cured he could have forgotten about Jesus and gone off to live his own life. Instead we are told that he 'followed Jesus along the road'. 'Followed him along the road' doesn't simply mean that he joined the crowd on the road to Jerusalem. There can be no doubt as to what St Mark intends - Bartimaeus followed Jesus on the way of Christian discipleship and that is the real climax of the story.

From being a mere believer, Bartimaeus became a disciple. There is a big difference between the two. One could be a believer without it having any effect on one's life but when one becomes a disciple one tries to live as a Christian. Bartimaeus was in darkness until he met Jesus. To believe in Jesus is to have an unfailing lamp for our path. We show that we are following his light by the way we live. St Paul says 'the effects of the light are seen in goodness, right living and truth'.

Here on earth, although we can have a sense of God, we do not see God himself. We have to be content to travel in the light of faith towards the land where we shall see as we are seen. We can make our own heartfelt prayer the prayer of Bartimaeus - 'Lord, that I may see." That we may see what is truly important in life and, above all, that we may see with the eyes of faith.

StF 641 – When circumstances make my life

- When circumstances make my life Too hard to understand, No doubt or fear, no pain or strife, Can snatch me from God's hand.
- In valleys where the path is steep, With shadows dark and long, I know the Shepherd leads his sheep -His grace will keep me strong.
- Though sorrow and perplexity Are often what I feel, Gethsemane and Calvary Affirm God's love is real.
- 4) It is enough for me to know God's promise and God's care: Wherever on life's path I go My Saviour will be there.

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Second Reflection - Mark 10:46-52

Picture this scene....Where are you in it? Are you one of those standing over the beggar, a look of disapproval on your face? It's easy to become one of the pretentious bystanders eager to protect Jesus, pompously insisting they know what is right for him. "Be quiet" they order the beggar, sitting there excluded as always, from the bustle, another outsider for Jesus to notice.

I said 'Picture this scene.' How can Bartimaeus picture anything? Imagine being blind, maybe treasuring the small smudge of grey that is left in the centre of your vision. I don't know how many of you watch 'Strictly come Dancing' on a Saturday evening but for those of you who do Isn't Chris absolutely amazing? He is performing just as well as the other competitors - probably better than some - and yet he can't see! When we lose one of our senses it seems that the other senses take over.

But to go back to the story, what Bartimaeus does first when he approaches Jesus, he throws off his cloak. He lets go of the old, tired cloak of habit, the heavy cloak that covers him in failure. He throws off his threadbare cloak and reveals the person within. He throws off his old self.

Picture how Bartimaeus 'sprang up', with what eagerness he sought the cure and his certainty that Jesus could do this for him. It is as if he knew at once that his secret hope was granted. He would have only one option but to follow Jesus into a new life, and in that new life, the old cloak of self would get in the way.

So if Jesus were to walk past us today and ask us 'What do you want me to do for you?' What would you say? What thing do you need most? Though at different times of our lives the specific request might change, the fundamental plea surely must always be "Draw me nearer to you".

Prayer

Father of light, in whom there is no trace of darkness, we thank you for the great gift of sight. Fill us with compassion for those who do not have it: direct the efforts that are made for their welfare; reveal to them the things which eye has not seen, and comfort them with the hope of seeing light everlasting; to which, in your great mercy, we ask you to bring us all. **Amen**

StF 706 – Longing for light

- Longing for light, we wait in darkness. Longing for truth, we turn to you. Make us your own, your holy people, Light for the world to see.
- Ch) Christ, be our light! Shine in our hearts. Shine through the darkness. Christ, be our light! Shine in your Church gathered today.
- Longing for peace, our world is troubled. Longing for hope, many despair. Your word alone has power to save us. Make us your living voice.

- Longing for food, many are hungry.
 Longing for water, many still thirst.
 Make us your bread, broken for others, Shared until all are fed.

Third Reflection – from Eddie Askew, Disguises of Love

Lord, what I really want is a world without problems. Where everything's easy and warm and cosy. A world I can predict, with no surprises. A world where riches don't turn into rags at midnight. A world of harmony and good feelings.

But its not like that Lord, there are wars and rumours of wars. Pain and exploitation. Broken lives on rubbish dumps where hope lies bleeding. Lord I don't understand the way you do things.
